Not counting errors during self-grading			
Paraphrasing written or spoken material from others without citation			
Lying about circumstances to seek deadline extensions			
Purchasing essays or papers without citation			
Buying or trading for completed homework			
Copying text from others (written or electronic) without citation			
Viewing classmates' exams with their approval			
Ignoring errors for classmates during grading			
Not reporting teacher mistakes in grading in your favor			
Altering test scores (forging, hacking, modifying)			
Seeking information from others who have already completed a test			
Turning in work for yourself with major uncited contribution by others (students, siblings, parents)			
Viewing classmates' exams without their approval
