## Developmental Assets among U.S. Youth: 2018 Update

Between 2012 and 2015, 121,157 US youth, grades 6 to 12, completed Search Institute's *Attitudes & Behaviors Survey*. Here are youth reports of each of the 40 assets, including a breakdown by gender (female and male).
